From the Director:

Welcome to 2017!

Exactly one year ago, the Peninsula Library was moving to the Boston Township Hall for the month of January so that the library could receive some much needed improvements. That whirlwind move to and back is well behind us (pshew!) and we have been enjoying the renovated spaces for almost a full year now. We do have plans to make other improvements to the library, possibly in 2017 if we can arrange the funding and make everything happen just right. One of our most pressing problems is making major renovations to the library's restrooms. We will keep you posted as we know more and as our plans come closer to fruition.

The year 2017 will hold a special place in the history of the Peninsula Library. Way back in 1942, the local Girl Scout troop threw a Halloween party sponsored by Union Grange #2380. The admission to the party? One book! That party netted about 100 books and \$40 in cash. From those humble beginnings, the Peninsula Library officially opened on the second floor of the Peninsula Village hall on February 16, 1943. As we approach the 75th anniversary of that party and the beginning of the library, we will be planning various events and activities to celebrate, commemorate, and reflect on the Peninsula Library and its history. What a different community this would be had that party not been held in 1942! Please watch this newsletter, visit our website or find us on Facebook to keep up with our plans for our anniversary.

As always, read through this issue of the newsletter and find a program or two of interest

to you or someone you know and circle that date on your calendar. The Peninsula Library sometimes has wonderful programs that are attended by small but very appreciative audiences. We try to have programs that would appeal to various ages and interests. If there is something that you would like to see a program on, please let us know and we will see if we can make it happen.

We also need your assistance with another issue. Because of the renovations and the move in January 2016, our circulation totals for 2016 are going to be down. Also, as a sign that the economy has improved, most every library is experiencing circulation reductions. What many people may not be aware of is that our funding is based partly on the number of items that we circulate. Of the five factors that determine funding from the State of Ohio (community population, number of facilities, square footage of facilities, circulation and percentage of the population that is classified as low to moderate income), circulation is the only factor that we really have much control over. Adding facilities and square footage might get us more money in the short term, but will ultimately cost us more for staffing and maintaining those spaces. Population levels and per capita income status are well beyond our control. Therefore, we ask that you help us out and borrow more materials in 2017. The circulation figure used to determine funding is a three year average. One good 2017 can help offset a lagging 2016!

The New Year brings with it the opportunity for new beginnings and new choices. As all of us try to make important changes to our lives in the form of New Year's resolutions, now is the time to discuss the opportunity to support the Peninsula Library through the Peninsula Library Foundation. The idea behind the Peninsula Library Foundation has always been to build an endowment to soften the blows that come with being a public-supported organization in tough

economic times.

For seven years in a row, the Peninsula Library Foundation has been able to provide much needed additional revenue to the Peninsula Library. For 2010, the Foundation presented the Library with \$500. In 2011 the amount presented was \$3500 which was used to purchase new patron computers. For 2012 the amount was \$4600 which was used to offset reductions in the amount of money available to purchase new books. In 2013, the Library was most grateful to receive \$7,000 which was used to develop a new website for the library. And finally in 2015 and 2016, the library received \$18,937 each year for a grand total of \$72,654 received to date.

We hope that you will take this opportunity to make the Peninsula Library Foundation a part of your New Year's resolutions. We need your support to continue to help the library provide much needed services and materials to the community. If you wish to donate, please use the form printed above. Learn How the Quarry Impacted the 1935 Mayor's Race at the Cuyahoga Valley Historical Museum!

The Cuyahoga Valley Historical Museum is a branch of the Peninsula Library & Historical Society organized for the purpose of interpreting and promoting the area's history through permanent and special exhibits. The Museum is housed on the second floor of the historic Boston Township Hall which was built in 1887.

Even though Peninsula area quarries had ceased to be in operation many years before the mayoral election of 1935, they still played a pivotal role in that year's race. Elmer Bronson Conger, who served as Peninsula's mayor for a total of 28 years, was trying to regain that office in the fall election of 1935. Running against Girden Harrington and Dan Billings, one of Conger's main platform issues was shutting down the nudists who had taken over the quarry on the Bishop family's property along 303. Said Conger, "Some nights there are as many as 200 men and women at that pool. They're a nuisance. They've been run out but they come back. We haven't had a mayor for years with guts enough to drive them out." Visit the Cuyahoga Valley Historical Museum to find out more about the fascinating history of Peninsula area stone quarries!
